

The wearing of "aprons" dates back almost to the beginning of time itself. On entering the Masonic Fraternity, each new member becomes a brother and is presented a Lambskin or White Leather Apron. The apron is given along with a lengthy explanation of its Masonic meaning. From that time forward the Brother wears the white apron in regular meetings, special ceremonies, and even, if he so chooses to be placed on his coffin which shall contain his earthly remains, and with them be laid beneath the silent clods of the valley." We are taught that the white apron is an ever present reminder of a "purity of life and rectitude of conduct, a never ending argument for nobler deeds, for higher thoughts, for purer actions." But do we really give thought to the other meanings, applications, and lessons that the white apron holds for each of us?

As we all know, aprons are worn by a number of individuals, both male and female for different purposes. A lady wears an apron when cooking to prevent staining to her clothing. Workmen often wear aprons to protect their clothing. A medical

doctor, dentist, or patient may wear an apron to protect from harmful X-Rays or medical usages. Even children wear aprons to protect their clothing when working with paints, or other materials. The list goes on and on for the

a constant reminder to make every effort to guard and protect ourselves from harm and evil and to make our lives and actions as spotless as the white apron.
