Major Sports Awards Named for Masons

Two of the top awards in professional sports – the *Stanley Cup* in hockey and the *Cy Young Award* in baseball – are named for members of the Masonic Fraternity.

Standing 35.25 inches tall and weighing 35 pounds, the Stanley Cup has become the most respected icon in all professional hockey. In this sport players compete to have their names forever engraved on “The Cup.” Each player from the championship team can borrow the Cup for a day, as it travels throughout the world visiting schools, clinics, and seminars as a goodwill ambassador for the sport. Sir Frederick Arthur Stanley, the 16th Earl of Derby, 1st Baron Stanley of Preston (a.k.a. Lord Stanley) was born in London in 1841. As a member of Parliament, he became Colonial Secretary and then the sixth Governor-General of Canada. During his stay in Canada, Lord Stanley attended the Montreal Winter Carnival, where hockey was one of the featured attractions. He realized there was a need for a challenge cup, and the award was created. The first year the Cup was officially given was in 1893. For Lord Stanley himself, he never did get to see his Cup awarded to a championship team. Upon the death of his brother, he returned to England to become the 16th Earl of Derby. He was elected president of the British Empire League in 1904 and died in 1908, leaving a legacy far greater than he would have ever imagined. Lord Stanley was a member of Royal Alpha Lodge, No. 16, in London, England.

Denton True “Cy” Young born in Gilmore, Ohio in 1867, worked on his family’s farm as a youth before starting his professional baseball career. He entered the major leagues in 1890 with the National League’s Cleveland Spiders and pitched for them until 1898. He then transferred to the St. Louis Cardinals franchise, and in 1901 jumped to the American League and played for the Boston Red Sox until 1908, helping them win the 1903 World Series. He finished his career with the Cleveland Naps and Boston Rustlers, retiring in 1911. Young was one of the hardest-throwing pitchers in the game early in his career, and later relied more on his control, as he remained active into his 40’s. During his 31-year legendary baseball career, Young won an unthinkable 511 games, almost 100 more than any other pitcher in history. In addition to career wins, he holds major league records for most career losses, innings pitched, games started, and complete games. He led his league in wins during five seasons and pitched three no-hitters. In 1937, he was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame. In 1956, the Cy Young Award was established in his honor to recognize the best pitcher in each league for the season. He was viewed as a connection between the origin and roots of American baseball and what we know and love about baseball today. Brother Cy Young was raised a Master Mason on February 29, 1904, in the Mystic Tie Lodge, No. 194, in Dennison, Ohio. He died in 1955, with more than 50 years in the Fraternity. Masons in eastern Ohio report that he frequently attended Masonic Meetings in the area prior to his death.

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
